- The Palliser region is a major part of a 2,300-mile highway system from the Gulf of Mexico through the United States to Southeast Alberta.
- Anchored by the Trans-Canada Highway which runs East-West through the region, with traffic counts in the region between approximately 2.5 – 3.0 million vehicles per year.
- Highways 36 and 41 run through the region and are major North-South trade corridors leading to the U.S via the Ports of Wild Horse, Aden/Whitlash and Coutts/Sweetgrass.
- Nine regional airports and the two national rail carriers service the PEP region.

We Know Pulse Processing

 Western Canada's best location for your next pulse processing facility: Over 600,000 acres of pulses are grown in the region. Shovel – ready land provides rail access, utilities, and skilled labour.



- There are 3,163 farms growing pulses on 606,962 acres in the Palliser region, according to the 2016 Census of Agriculture. Chickpeas, lentils and dry beans grown in the Palliser region account for 80% of Alberta's pulse crop production.
- For grain and pulse processing companies in need of rail access: The Oyen Rail Yard, part of the CN Rail network, provides 155 acres of railside land and approximately 1,000 of rail siding. The Foremost Rail Yard connects to CP Rail via the Forty Mile Rail short line rail.
